WINTER WEATHER TIPS FOR YOUR PETS

Here are just a few handy hints to help make this Ontario winter just a little easier for you and your creatures...

- Puppies and older dogs are much more sensitive to the cold than adult dogs – use caution when taking them outdoors for longer periods of time
- Coats and booties can help keep your dog warm in the cold weather – look for coats/sweaters with high collars and belly protectors for maximum warmth
- When returning from walks, thoroughly wipe your dog's paws to remove snow, ice and road salt. Leaving these items on the paws can be irritating to the underlying skin, and may be harmful to your dog if they are ingested from licking
- Booties can help to reduce foot pad irritation provided they are fit well
- Dry, sensitive paws can be coated with cooking spray before walking in cold weather
- Use caution when leaving pets outdoors in the winter. Cats that are usually fine to be left out during the warmer weather can freeze, or be injured by the cold. Dogs that are left outdoors must be provided with a shelter to protect them from the elements and need a supply of fresh and unfrozen water
- Don't let your dog off leash in heavy or deep snow – they can lose their scent and become lost more easily

FROSTBITE ??

Just like us, our pets are susceptible to frostbite if left outdoors for long periods of time in the cold weather. This happens because as the body cools down, blood is directed to keep the internal organs functioning, and supply to the extremities is reduced. This can lead to freezing of the tips of the ears, the tail, face, footpads, legs and even the male genitalia. Severe cases can require surgical removal of damaged tissue.

Signs of frostbite include seeing ice on the body or limbs of your pet, severe shivering, tissues are initially bright red in colour, then become pale, then blacken First aid

- Warm the affected area with warm water using towels
- If a limb or paw is affected, this area may be soaked in a warm bath
- Do not rub or massage frozen tíssue

HOLIDAY PET HEALTH HAZARDS

we all love our pets for their curiosity, but certain holiday traditions can be risky for their health.

Take care during the holiday season to keep your pet safe by avoiding the following:

- Ornaments may be chewed or swallowed and cause choking or internal damage
- Líghts electrocutíon hazard, and trees can fall down on unsuspecting pets
- Tínsel appealing for cats to play with but can cause choking or act as an intestinal foreign body requiring surgical removal
- Tree stand water secretions from the tree can cause mild to severe gastric complications
- Místletoe § Holly moderately to severely toxic, causing seízures, tremors and even death
- Poínsettías míldly toxíc, may cause nausea or vomítíng
- Líllies & Daffodils can cause liver failure in cats if ingested
- Chocolate a caníne favouríte, can cause vomítíng, díarrhea and even seízures
- Grapes/Raísíns toxíc to dogs, may cause vomíting and díarrhea and can lead to renal failure
- Fatty or Spicy foods some of these rich foods can trigger a lifethreatening inflammation of the pancreas or intestines
- Antifreeze deadly poison pets with a sweet taste. As little as 1-2 teaspoons can be fatal
